13 14	B. No person other than a licensed lottery retailer or the retailer's employee or the Agency_may sell a lottery ticket or a lottery subscription.
15 16	C. A retailer shall require all lottery tickets to be paid for by the purchaser at the time of <a href="mailto:purchase">purchase</a> buying and before the time of the drawing.
17	D. A retailer may not:
18	(1) Sell a ticket at any price other than that established by the Director;
19	(2) Sell to or cash a lottery ticket for a person younger than 18 years old; or
